Today, this is the home to many Indigenous People from across Turtle Island and we are grateful to have the opportunity to work in this community, on their territory.

Reflecting on the past year, success is the single word that reflects the outcomes achieved across Brantwood Community Services. This year's annual report shares both the efforts and achievements from Brantwood's strategic plan.

A focus on growing the workforce included training that reskilled Team Members supporting health changes an aging population faces from diabetes to dementia. As an organization, we continued to shift from person centered supports to person directed supports. From listening to people's choices to following people's direction so that they are living a life of their choosing. As an organization, Brantwood expanded connections across the Province so that we may both share and learn from the best practices of other agencies in the Developmental Services Sector.

As a member of the MCCSS and Provincial Network Workforce Initiative, we facilitated Operational Leadership and provided a unique perspective at the Collaborative Table.

There was even more success with Brantwood and our Union partners SEIU ratifying a 3 year Collective Agreement stabilizing the workforce and supporting good relationships with Team Members. We are proud of Brantwood's annual turnover rate of less than 4% in a Sector struggling with recruitment and retention. while celebrating retirements of 30+ vear Team Members and recognizing the dedicated professionals who have chosen a career in Developmental Services and Brantwood to do their good work. This year's success is built on the dedicated efforts of all Brantwood Team members and the Leadership Team. On behalf of the Board of Directors, we want to thank each Team Member for their dedication, and for growing supports to reflect what people want and how they want to be supported. We also recognize families, friends and community partners for your support and partnership.



Journey to Belonging supports Brantwood's Mission and Vision and together we are supporting people to live their life as they choose. This is the road that will lead to a community where every member realizes full citizenship and belonging. 
Robert receives the right supports, at the right time to live a life of his choosing and for the entire summer, Robert and his Able Sail instructor stretched their legs and shared their passions.

Refocusing on people living a life of their choosing so that their community reflects the diversity and abilities of the people served by Brantwood was the focus in 2023 2024.

18 Housing Options 15 Locations

People supported reconnected with families and friends, doing what they wanted to do and returned to sharing birthdays, vacations, art exhibits and concerts.

Residential supports also evolved to meet the changing health needs of people served including the installation of X/Y lifts, training for staff and the implementation of an electronic medication system.

2 people were supported to transition from long term placements at the local hospital to a home of their own with the support of the DSO, Brant community planning table, MCCSS, and Brantwood.

Delivering on our commitment to people, goals achieved included connecting with family, learning to ride a horse, graduating, and sailing.

Originally, Bell Lane supported 7 people in one home and after investing Financial Flexibility, the home was duplexed into a 4 bedroom space and 3 individual mini-apartments with a shared kitchen and living room.



Brantwood continues to invest in changes with the support of MCCSS and local government so that we can explore how the current housing can better reflect people's choices and affordability.

Friends4Kindness hosts inclusive themed dances to promote social opportunities and relationships. When looking for a space to host the dances, Brantwood was excited to be selected as the location. 
Financials 2023 - 2024

The Fiscal year 2023-24 continued to focus resources on delivering services to people supported in a variety of settings: 24/7, Supported Independent Living, Shared Care, Respite and Community Connections.


Brantwood also invested in replacing aging infrastructure including HVAC systems, accessible bathtub replacements, and updating all fire alarm systems as copper landlines are no longer being serviced.

The year ended with a successful ratification of a three - year agreement with SEIU and funding from Canada-Ontario Community Housing Initiative (COCHI) for \$44,970 to complete capital projects including shower replacement and fencing by March 2025.

The Inn on Strawberry Hill provides overnight respite to people and their families living in Brantford -Brant.

19,200 Hours of Support

The Inn has welcomed many new guests who have experienced changes within their family. Respite provides an important break for everyone and for some, allows other family members to focus on their health and recovery.

The Inn continued to support friendships and connections throughout 2023/24 with friends planning their stays to be together. The Inn also supported the emergency needs of the Brantford community supporting over 10 weeks of emergency respite.

A member organization of the Specialized Clinical DS Network, in 2024 Brantwood supported the rename and redesign of this provincial advocacy group that advocates for the importance of clinical services and funding in the DS Sector including Behaviour Consultants, Psychiatrists and RPNs.


MicroCredential Pilot



Support Network of Canada

Funded by MCCSS, the Provincial Network and Ontario Tech University launched the Microcredentials Pilot to support capacity building and reskilling in the DS Sector. The pilot was limited to nursing and allied health professionals. Brantwood was invited to participate and provide feedback on the modules specialized for dual diagnosis and mental health supports: Mental Health Pharmacology, Trauma Informed Care, and Mental Health Law. Following the completion of each microcredential, Brantwood evaluated the content and provided considerations for future delivery. The goal is to complete the evaluation and finalize modules that can be taken by all staff working in Developmental Services.





Grow a Skilled, Diverse & Engaged Workforce 2023-2024



Human Resources focused on the strategic goal of growing a skilled and diverse workforce over the past year. All team members completed Person Directed Choice Training. This series focused on choice and voice and the responsibilities of team members to deliver outcomes people want. The interactive sessions are followed by discussions at team meetings so we are always putting people we serve first.

Brantwood celebrated years of service and wished long term team members "Happy Retirement" and appreciation for a dedicated career in Developmental Services.

HR completed an Orientation review with feedback from leadership and frontline team members resulting in changes that includes additional information on Journey to Belonging, career pathing at Brantwood and tours with personal introductions for new hires.

Human Resources also expanded collaboration with local and Provincial groups including the Workforce Planning Board of Grand Erie, the South Central HR Committee, and the Provincial Network HR Committee. Learning from others and supporting initiatives across the Sector ensures we remain an employer of choice.

Grow a Skilled, Diverse & Engaged Workforce







Lambton Community Developmental Services (LCDS) received \$179,400 in an innovative training project to train DSPs using custom-made virtual reality training modules to improve skills or gain the training needed to start rewarding careers in the industry.

Fall HR Forum, Brantwood and LCDS enter into a collaborative agreement to establish additional VR training modules for the sector and develop a training library. Phase 1 completed in the 2023/24 fiscal year, with LCDS providing 5 modules including medication training, fire extinguisher, and vehicle check. Phase 2 will invite other DS organizations to join the collaborative with the addition of a new training module in 2024/2025.

Brantwood commissioned Melcher to develop module 6 - Meal Supports. This module focuses on the staff role in meal preparation and consistency, how to support different people with their meals.

2024/25 goals: implement VR meal supports to all frontline staff
Explore VR and AI model to develop Leadership training (coaching)
Introduce opportunity for agencies to join the VR Collaborative at Fall HR Forum











The Brantwood Foundation continues to support the work of Brantwood Community Services raising funds and awareness for the delivery of essential services and supports for people with developmental disabilities.

The Board of Directors welcomed Jordan William through a partnership with Wilfrid Laurier University's Youth Leaders on Board program. Jordan joined the Board on her placement gaining experience and providing a diverse perspective to the Foundation Board.

The Annual Wheelchair Basketball Tournament welcomed 12 teams from Brantford, Brant and Six Nations with the Branlyn Neighbourhood Association claiming the victory. A great event and partnership with tournament co-host Participation Support Services raising awareness and over \$7500.
