# A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As we head into the final year of Brantwood Community Services current strategic plan, we are proud to reflect on all that has been accomplished since its launch in 2016/17. Our collective efforts to innovate and advance the organization were validated this year when Brantwood was awarded a three year international accreditation from CARF. This international accreditation represents the highest level of accreditation that can be given to an organization and tells all our stakeholders that Brantwood meets the highest standards of quality and operational excellence.

Driven by the diverse and changing needs of people supported and families as well as changes in government policy and funding models, we continue to restructure Brantwood to expand and improve our service delivery, optimize our operations and achieve strategic outcomes. The Parents Helping Parents Resource Group continues to meet monthly. We developed new residential supports focusing on supported independent living and enhanced existing residential services to better meet the needs of youth transitioning to adult supports. We are excited about future housing opportunities with Habitat for Humanity and projects supported by Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

We continue to transform the Abilities Centre's supports to be a facilitator of inclusive community based activities that meet the goals of the people who use them. The addition of a new Aktion Club is a good example of a community partnership that recognizes the value and gifts of people with disabilities to make meaningful contributions to their community. Brantwood now offers day, evening, weekend and vacation style respite with "before and after hours" support to help families achieve work-life balance. Respite spaces at the Inn on Strawberry Hill were filled most weekends throughout 2019/20.

We continue to take steps to strengthen our financial position. We aligned our funding allocation to meet

the increasing complex needs of people we serve. Through careful planning and strategy, we diversified our revenue streams by growing our fee-for-service programs and expanding Brantwood's Back Office Corporate Services in the areas of facility services, administration, IT, clinical consultation, accounting and finance. New policies, processes and HR systems have been introduced to enhance, streamline and maximize these functions.

The Board of Directors continues to monitor all aspects of Brantwood's operations and the strategic report card reflects Brantwood's performance. The many achievements and advances of the past four years can be attributed to Brantwood's exceptional employees and volunteers, whose creativity and commitment are the cornerstone of Brantwood's success.

The year ahead will be challenging as we move through the global pandemic. Please consider a donation to the Brantwood Foundation to support our ongoing work.

We thank the people we support and their families, all employees, volunteers and members of the Board, our community partners, funders and donors— for their many contributions. Together, we have made great progress. The years ahead will, no doubt, bring new challenges and changes, but we are confident, with your continued commitment and support, that Brantwood's future will remain bright.

## PASSPORT, ABILITIES CENTRE & RESPITE

Opportunities expanded throughout 2019/20 for community involvement, social and communication skills building, independence training, healthy living, recreation, leisure and respite.

The Abilities Centre launched a new **Learning and Leisure Guide** – a user friendly and accessible guide outlining all program and course descriptions in an easy to navigate format.

The **Parents Helping Parents** Resource Group held monthly meetings to develop a support network and share solutions. Families have appreciated the availability of Abilities Centre respite services while they are participating in the monthly Parent Helping Parents meetings.

A **Kiwanis Aktion Club** offered new service leadership opportunities throughout 2019. Aktion Club members worked together to serve and improve their communities and made an extraordinary impact on the lives of those around them.







#### WE HEARD YOU!

This year we focused on what people and their families said they needed most and how Brantwood could best support those needs. **Respite** supports were identified as the **#1 priority** and Brantwood responded with:

- Additional opportunities for overnight and weekend respite by opening up a 6th bed at the Inn on Strawberry Hill
- Added 2 additional weeks of **Summer Escape**
- Provided extended hours with "Before and After" Respite supports through the Abilities Centre
- Added new Christmas and New Year's respite supports

An expanded focus on Respite services to people and families proved to be valuable as the **Inn on Strawberry Hill** was booked at capacity every weekend throughout the year and **Camps** were fully booked for all 10 weeks.

The Fiscal Year 2019-20 was another successful year for Brantwood Community Services.


Continued financial support from the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services enabled Brantwood to provide exemplary on-going support to people and their families throughout the year

As well, Brantwood had another year of increased


